

Women want face-to-face financial advice – men just hate the cost

Men and women take very different approaches towards managing their investments, a new study has claimed, with women more likely to opt for face-to-face advice, even though financial advisers can fall short of their expectations.

¹____, compared with 28 percent of men, according to a new study by EY, the accountancy firm. While men cited high fees for financial advice as their top complaint, women were more concerned about an adviser's lack of knowledge.

Women were also less likely to engage with their financial life as frequently as their male counterparts, with 2 ___ , compared with almost half of men.

While technology and the ability to review investments online is making decision-making less time-consuming, just 53 percent of women said they check their investments online, 3____.

'Women view achieving their personal goals as more important than investment performance, so a deep understanding by the advisers of the personal goals and priorities is vital to satisfying female clients,' said Gill Lofts, head of Wealth & Asset Management at EY.

Drawing on the findings of the study, 4 ____ , she said women placed particular value on advisers who can clearly explain their investment views and decisions.

'We believe women are looking for a financial coach who will work with them on their personal goals throughout their life events, in a much more collaborative and consultative fashion than they're currently experiencing,' she added.

Ms Lofts cited a separate study by the Centre for Talent Innovation, ⁵____. 'Women will use tech, but when it comes to more complex decision-making processes, they expect face-to-face meetings to be high quality.'

The findings build on existing research on the gender investment gap, such as the commonly held view that 6__ than men. A number of studies indicate that less than 50 percent of all strategic alliances live up to original expectations, something I know from my own experience. ¹____ Unfortunately, many companies only focus on their own desired goals, such as increasing their revenue, rather than on how to achieve these objectives in today's fast-changing world.

So, when a company decides to look for a strategic alliance, it should outline clearly what it wants from that alliance. The key to success is a collaborative working relationship between the two companies. ²____ This is done by highlighting the differences and creating a shared strategy. There is nothing worse than two companies with different work cultures refusing to change the way they work.

The senior managers need to drive this collaboration and lead by example. To do this, they may have to think outside the box. ³_____ Managers have to realise that alliances require a different kind of thinking because, in reality, the two companies are still competitors, but they are also cooperating with each other.

One company I was working with entered into an alliance with a bigger competitor. Initially, it seemed that they would benefit greatly from an increased customer base and entry into new markets. However, the R&D department had developed an innovative material and they were worried about sharing this confidential information with their partner. Without openness and trust the alliance was bound to fail. It soon became obvious that this was the key reason why the other company had wanted to enter into the alliance in the first place. ⁴_____ We should have realised that the partner's size might have been an obstacle for us. Is courage the key to good business decisions?

'Whenever you see a successful business, someone once made a courageous decision.' - Peter F. Drucker

Α

Successful business decisions have been analysed and dissected a multitude of times in an attempt to provide a roadmap for effective decision-making. So, why is it that so many people are still frightened of making the wrong decision? They seem to have forgotten that you can only make the best decision you can with the knowledge you have at any one point, and it can only then be declared a good decision further down the line if the required results are achieved.

В

All decision-making by nature involves a certain amount of risk because no one can accurately predict the future. An individual can try to limit those risks by assessing all the factors surrounding each decision, but many external factors are out of their control, especially in today's globally connected businesses. What is happening on the other side of the world can affect a business thousands of miles away. Decision-makers, therefore, need to accept that they may never make a perfect decision.

C

As Drucker observed, business leaders sometimes have to make *courageous* decisions. Nevertheless, these should not be confused with making rushed or reckless decisions – it should be a calculated risk. Moreover, successful

decision-makers are not scared of making mistakes, instead they learn from them. They maintain a positive outlook even when things do not go according to plan, and are able to pick themselves up and quickly find ways of resolving the situation.

D

Successful decision-makers do not shy away from making a difficult decision, and they do not worry about losing face if a problem arises as a result of one of their decisions. Good decision-makers are constantly looking for the root cause of any problem and seeking to find a real solution and not just a temporary fix. They consider the health of their organisation first, rather than their own image or reputation.

Ε

Today, the pace of change is faster than ever before and people may feel under pressure to make decisions more quickly than they would like. However, there is much more information available at the touch of a button so there is no excuse to be out of touch with what is happening globally. Decision-makers need to use all the knowledge at their disposal, but without becoming overloaded with irrelevant information.

According to the recent market research survey, the new chocolate bar has not had a positive response from our product testers. Unfortunately, the majority of respondents favoured both the taste and size of the original chocolate bar, while almost none of the participants preferred the new, improved recipe. Worryingly, almost half of those surveyed believed that the new bar uses cheaper ingredients, whereas it uses premium ingredients, increasing production costs by 12 percent. Despite the fact that around a third of the responses suggested that customers would be happy to pay more for a better-quality product, more than two thirds reported that they would be unlikely to buy this product should the current price increase. Three quarters of the testers also raised concerns that the quality does not reflect the luxury brand image. Interestingly, despite the negative comments about the taste of the product, the findings also indicated that a quarter of the participants would be interested in seeing more flavours added to the current range. The survey confirmed that we need to reconsider both the improved recipe and the pricing of the product. As a result, we will carry out further improvements and a further round of market research before launching the product.

Model answer

Taking all the factors mentioned into account, there are two courses of action to improve time management. There were many suggestions made. which included hiring a consultant on a temporary contract or using the HR department. Having considered the options, a reasonable approach would seem to be to use a team from HR to carry out initial research. This would take place in three steps and would include the following: investigating the effectiveness of our current work patterns and conducting consultations with all staff to discover any issues which employees feel might affect task efficiency in their role. As the third step, we will investigate ways to improve staff engagement, for example, by providing suggestion boxes or running competitions for the best idea to improve productivity. Some of the recent problems we have experienced have occurred as a result of sudden changes made to work rotas.

Because these were made without giving staff sufficient advance warning, there were a significant number of complaints. Therefore, I would also like to recommend new procedures which would allow at least three days' notice for any changes to rotas. It would also be advisable to use online tools to manage projects so that everyone has access to the schedules at any given time.

Finally, I propose we carry out additional training on time management for all employees over the next three weeks.
