
Year 1 Home School Reading Diary



STRIVE to make your child a more confident reader by following these easy strategies...

Support: Give your child lots of positive praise, **support** and encouragement before, after and during reading.

Tell: Can your child tell you what they think will happen next?

Retrieve: Can your child retrieve information from the text if you ask questions?

Infer: Can your child use clues from the text (**infer** information) to say how someone is feeling or why something might happen?

Vocabulary: Can your child discuss why the author has used certain **vocabulary** in a text?

Evaluate: Can your child **evaluate** what they have read: Did they enjoy what they read? Why or why not?



Why not introduce your child to our friendly set of canine helpers who ask different types of questions about what they have read?

Vocabulary Questions with Vocabulary Victor

Vocabulary Victor will help you to look at how authors and poets have chosen to use certain words and phrases.



Victor might ask:

- Can you find a word/sentence that tells you/shows that...?
- Why did the author use the word ... to describe ...?
- Can you find a word in the text that means the same as...?
- How/ where can we find out the meaning of this word?



Retrieval Questions with Rex Retriever

Rex Retriever will help you to go into a text and retrieve the facts.

Rex might ask:

- Where/when is the story/poem set? Who is/are the main character(s)?
- Is there a dilemma in this story? How is it solved?
- Which is your favourite/worst/funniest/scariest part of the poem/ story? Why?
- Tell me three facts you have found out from the text.

Sequence Questions with Sequencing Suki

Sequencing Suzi likes everything in order! She will help you sequence the events in a text.



Suki might ask:

- How/where does the story/poem/non-fiction text start?
- What happened at the end of the ...?
- Could you use 20 words to sum up this story/poem/non-fiction text?



Inference Questions with Inference Iggy

Inference Iggy will help you hunt for clues in a text about how someone might be feeling or why something is happening.

Iggy might ask:

- What do you think the word... means? Why do you think that?
- Why do you think...?
- How do you think…?
- When do you think...?
- Where do you think...?

Prediction Questions with Predicting Pip

Predicting Pip tries to see the future and she will help you work out what might happen next.



Pip might ask:

- Where do you think ... will go next?
- What do you think... will say/do next?
- What do you think this book/section will be about?
- How do you think this will end?

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
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
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Make a Word Search

Design a Book Character




- · What is your character's name?
